Outlander (or Cross Stitch to UK readers)
was first published in 1991.

It was author Diana Gabaldon's second brush with
Scottish 'history', if you take account of her comic
strips for Disney's Scrooge McDuck.

The historical fantasy follows the story of Claire
Randall, a married English combat nurse from 1945
who, while on a second honeymoon in Inverness, is
mysteriously swept back in time to the 18th-century
Scottish Highlands. There she meets Jamie Fraser,
a chivalrous young warrior, with whom she becomes
romantically entwined.

A further eight novels and several spin-offs have
been published in 43 countries and in 39 languages,
selling more than 35 million printed copies
worldwide.

It wasn't until 2014 that Outlander made its screen
debut.

Developed by American screenwriter and producer
Ronald D. Moore (Star Trek, the reimagined
Battlestar Galactica), it put Caitríona Balfe in the role
of Claire and Galloway-born actor Sam Heughan in
the role of Jamie.

Moore admitted that he didn't know much about
the history of Scotland when he first read the book

but was drawn to the historical world Gabaldon had
populated and saw the potential for a TV series.

When it came to choosing where to shoot the series,
it could only be Scotland.

The production created its own studio in
Cumbernauld and, bar brief sojourns to Eastern
Europe and South Africa, over the course of eight
seasons Scotland has been the home of Outlander,
with locations across the country doubling for the
USA, France and even the Caribbean.

Scotland isn't shy of appearing on screen, from
Hollywood blockbusters to cult classics; film fans
have been flocking to discover the real country
for decades.

But there has been nothing quite like the
Outlander effect.

Whether it is filming locations or attractions linked
to Scotland's past, all have been touched by the
fans. Their enthusiasm for the series has helped
to support so much of the country's heritage,
even supporting conservation projects, such as
Tibbermore Church, and the National Trust for
Scotland's Preston Mill.

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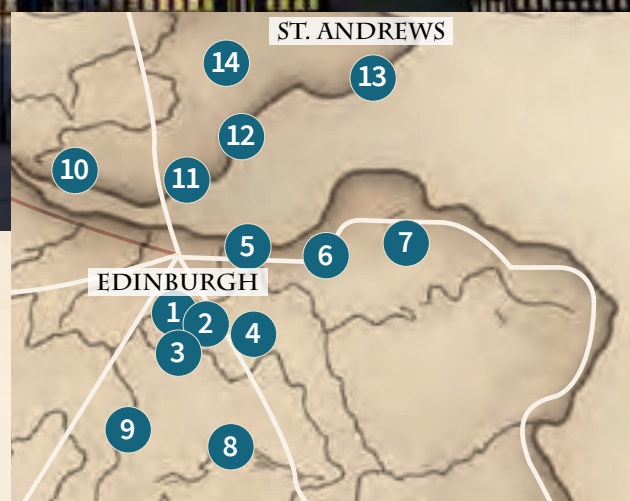

1 Tweeddale Court - Edinburgh Season 3

The hustle and bustle of the market where Claire is reunited with Fergus was filmed here. The entrance to this time capsule of a street is from the historic Royal Mile. Take time to explore one of the oldest parts of Edinburgh.

2 Bakehouse Close - Edinburgh Season 3

Bakehouse Close just off Edinburgh's Royal Mile was the setting for Jamie's Print Shop and where Claire reunited with Jamie after years of separation. This is one of the best-preserved closes in the city and was transformed into 18th century Edinburgh for exterior shots of the Print Shop. 3 Signet Library - Edinburgh Season 3

The stunning interior of the Signet Library in Edinburgh's Old Town was transformed into the Governor's Mansion in Jamaica. The library is home to the prestigious Society of Writers to His Majesty's Signet which dates back to the 15th century.

The ruined medieval castle of Craigmillar became Ardsmuir Prison, the place of Jamie's incarceration. Visit the castle to admire the views across Edinburgh. Interesting fact: Mary Queen of Scots used the castle as a safe-haven in 1566.

Located just a few miles east of Edinburgh, this 17th century Palladian villa served as Governor Tryon's home in North Carolina, where Jamie discussed the offer of a land grant in exchange for service to the English Crown. 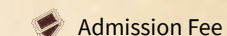
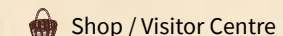
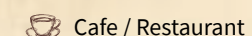
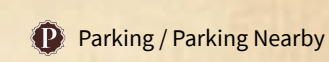
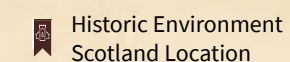
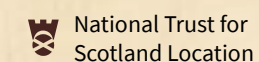


6 Gosford House - East Lothian Seasons 2 & 3

Originally designed by one of Scotland's greatest architects, Robert Adam, the grounds that surround this lavishly decorated house doubled as the Palace of Versailles in France (S2) and Helwater and Ellesmere (S3). Note: part of the grounds is available for public use, but the house is only open for visiting on certain days. Please check before you travel.

7 Preston Mill - East Lothian Season 1

In the village of East Linton is the picturesque Preston Mill – one of the oldest working, water-driven meal mills in Scotland. It provided the backdrop for several scenes during the Jacobite Uprisings. Tour the mill to see the mechanisms in action and learn about its history and the people who lived and worked there.

8 Arniston House - Midlothian Season 4

Home to the Dundas Family for over 400 years, this magnificent mansion house set in acres of parkland is located 11 miles from Edinburgh. It doubled as both the theatre entrance and lobby where Jamie and Claire attended a play in Wilmington with Governor Tryon, and where Claire's medical skills saved Edward Fanning's life.

11 Aberdour Castle - Fife Season 1

This 12th century castle doubled as the monastery where Claire and Murtagh brought Jamie to recover after his ordeal at the prison, with the Old Kitchen and Long Gallery used for filming. Situated on the Fife coast, this splendid ruined castle is amongst the oldest standing masonry castles in Scotland.

This charming church, nestled in the grounds of Glencorse House in the foothills of the Pentlands, is where Claire and Jamie tied the knot. 10 Culross - Fife Seasons 1, 2, 4 & 7

The Mercat Cross in the coastal village of Culross was transformed into Cranesmuir, and its Palace grounds as Claire's herb garden at Castle Leoch (S1). The ruined Black Kirk (S1) is close to the village centre. Culross also featured as a Jacobite encampment and makeshift hospital (S2) and Balriggan Cottage where Laoghaire lived (S4) and where Gelis has déjà vu meeting Roger (S7)

13 The Scottish Fisheries Museum - Fife Season 2

The Reaper is an historic two-masted 'Fifie' fishing boat that appeared as one of the vessels in Dysart Harbour, which portrayed the port of Le Havre in Outlander. She is currently being restored to her original glory and is one of the last authentic survivors of this type of vessel. Berthed in Anstruther harbour, she is cared for by the Scottish Fisheries Museum.

14 Falkland - Fife Seasons 1, 2 & 4

The town of Falkland was transformed into 1940s (S1) and 1960s (S2, S4) Inverness. The Covenanter Hotel became Mrs. Baird's Guesthouse; the Bruce Fountain was where Jamie's ghost looked up at Claire's window; Fayre Earth Gift Shop doubled as Farrell's Hardware and Furniture Store; and Campbell's Coffee House and Eatery featured as itself.

15 Beecraigs Country Park - West Lothian Season 4

Situated near the town of Linlithgow, this 913-acre country park is a great place for enjoying the countryside and visiting red deer and Highland cattle. Have fun at the play area or stay for longer at the caravan & camping site. The park doubled as the North Carolina wilderness which Jamie and Claire rode through after leaving River Run. On the journey through the forest, they became separated during a thunder storm and Claire was haunted by the ghost of Otter-Tooth.

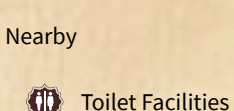
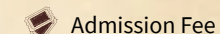
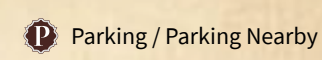
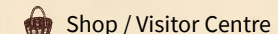
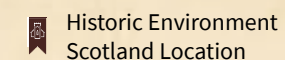
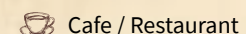
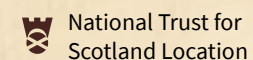


16 Linlithgow Palace - West Lothian Season 1

The entrance and corridors of this ruined palace were used as Wentworth Prison where Jamie was imprisoned. Once a favoured royal residence of the Stewart kings and queens and the birthplace of Mary Queen of Scots, this wonderful 15th century site, with its elegant courtyard, still oozes charm.

17 Hopetoun House - West Lothian Seasons 1, 2, 3, 7 & 8

One of Scotland's finest stately homes, Hopetoun House doubled as the home of the Duke of Sandringham (S1); provided the backdrop for Parisian streets; a room in Jamie and Claire's Paris apartment; and the Hawkins Estate (S2); and Ellesmere and the stables at Helwater (S3). In the final 2 seasons, it was the scene of the London Tube station flashback, Lord Harald Grey's Westminster Office, Lord John Grey's Residence in Savannah, a Shadow Lake residence and Mohawk Village in New York.

18 Midhope Castle - West Lothian Multiple Seasons (including 1,2,3 & 7)

This 16th century tower house is used as the exterior of Lallybroch, the estate of Brian and Ellen Fraser. It is here that Roger meets Brian and Jenny wants Claire to cure Ian. It is also used as North Carolina and the New York battlefields.

Located between Linlithgow and Falkirk, the park lent its backdrop to the dramatic Battle of Prestonpans, and doubled both as a British encampment and the English countryside. It is also where Jamie and Roger are seen hunting buffalo when Jamie is bitten by a snake.

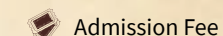
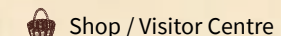
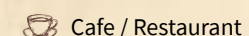
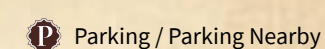
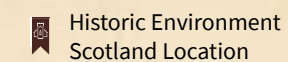
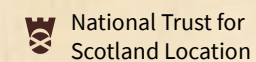


20 Gray Buchanan Park - Falkirk Season 4

Known locally as Parkhill, the site has pretty woodland areas alongside the meandering Polmont Burn, and large rolling parkland areas with mature tree avenues. This is where Jamie and Young Ian buried Gavin Hayes after he was hanged for stealing in Charleston, South Carolina. Please note there is no graveyard in the park.

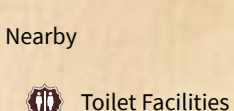
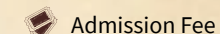
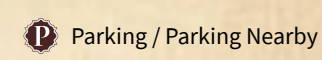
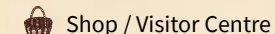
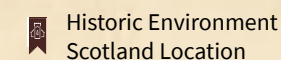
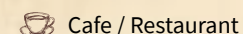
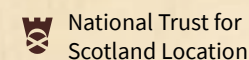


30 Dunkeld House Hotel - Perth & Kinross Seasons 4 & 5

Nestled in the beautiful Perthshire countryside and overlooking the River Tay, this hotel sits in 280 acres of woodland which doubled as the North Carolina wilderness where Jamie, Claire and Young Ian set off in search of Roger who had been sold to the Mohawk. 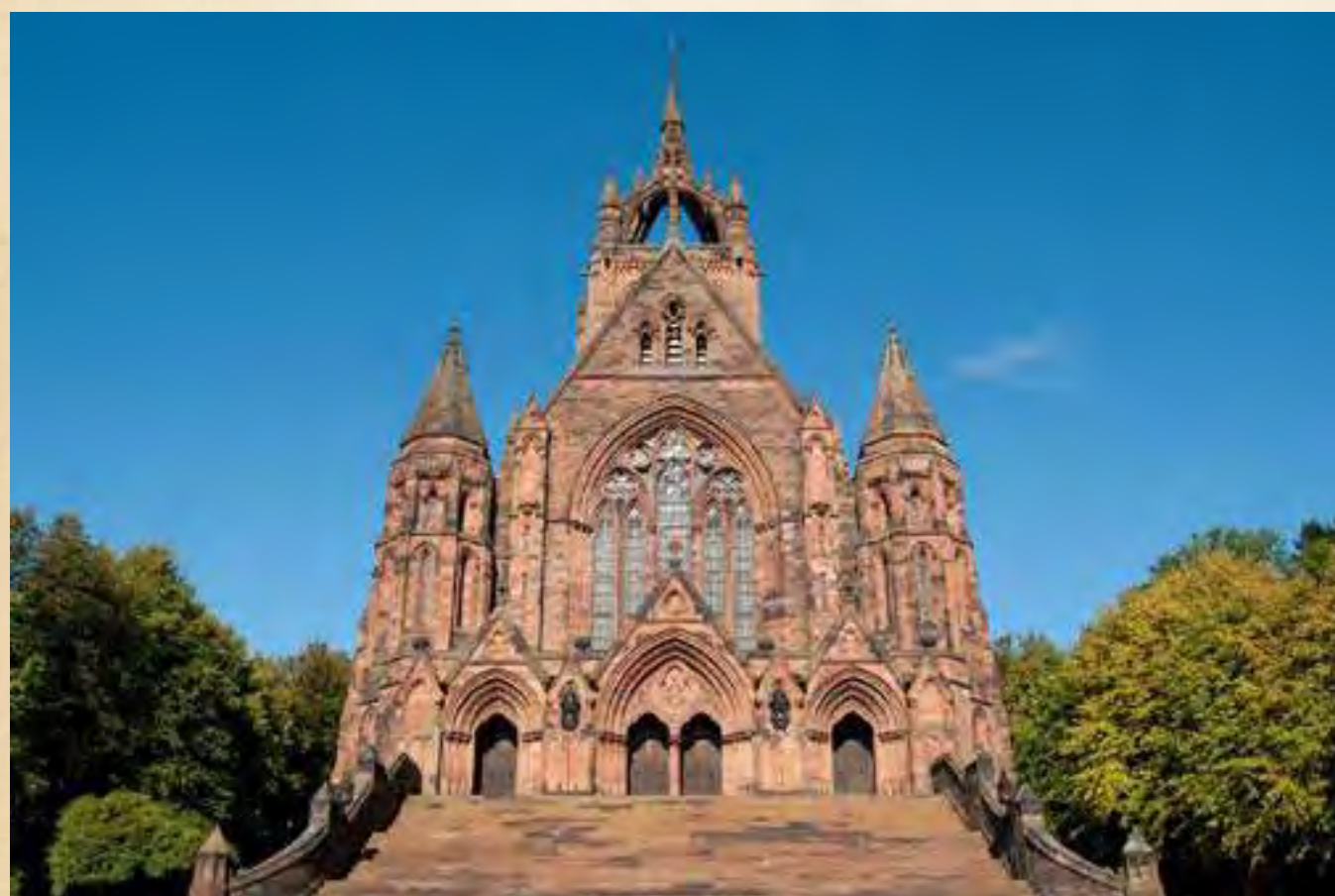

SCOTLAND'S HISTORY

The standing stones of Craigh na Dun are the link between the past and present in Outlander.

The fictional stones are inspired by the real historic sites of Clava Cairns, found outside of Inverness, and the Calanais Standing Stones on the Isle of Lewis.

Scotland is a land full of standing stones – 1,233 sites in total, including 352 which feature a Pictish symbol stone – some of which are the most ancient in Europe.

These include UNESCO World Heritage Site, the Heart of Neolithic Orkney, which features The Stones of Stenness (considered the earliest henge monument in the British Isles) and The Ring of Brodgar.

And while they may not contain time-travelling properties, they do connect the country to its past, having watched over Scotland for 5,000 years.

Let's look at some of those moments from Scotland's past which led to the events portrayed in Outlander.

1100-1300s

The establishment of the clan system in Scotland.

1295

The Auld Alliance is created between Scotland and France. The military and diplomatic alliance was in response to threats by the English kingdom.

1314

The Battle of Bannockburn, in which Robert the Bruce, King of Scots, defeats King Edward II of England, was a major turning point in the Scottish wars of independence. The National Trust for Scotland's The Battle of Bannockburn visitor experience is a must-visit to understand the importance of this event.

1320

The Declaration of Arbroath is signed. The original copy is held in the National Library of Scotland however, the story of the declaration is recounted at Historic Environment Scotland's Arbroath Abbey.

1542

Mary, Queen of Scots is crowned at only six days of age. She reigned until her forced abdication in 1567, and was later sentenced to death by her cousin Queen Elizabeth I of England. Historic Environment Scotland's Lochleven Castle, near Kinross, was the dramatic setting of her escape from captivity.

1567

James VI, the son of Mary, Queen of Scots, is crowned King of Scots. He would later take the throne of England, following the death of Queen Elizabeth I, uniting the crowns in 1603. The Church of the Holy Rude in Stirling was the site of his coronation to the Scottish throne, and is still in use today.

1707

The Acts of Union between the English and Scottish parliaments take place.

1745

Bonnie Prince Charlie launches an attempt to reclaim the throne his grandfather, King James VII of Scotland and II of England, lost in 1688. It would become known as the 1745 Jacobite Rising.

1746

The Battle of Culloden, on the outskirts of Inverness, marked the end of the Jacobite Rising. Visitors can find out more about the battle and explore the field at the National Trust for Scotland's Culloden site.

1771

Sir Walter Scott, creator of the modern historical novel is born. His Jacobite novels Waverley and Rob Roy were a sensation with the reading public and sparked an interest in Scotland and the Highlands.

CLANS & ANCESTRY

What do Highlander Jamie Fraser and a sonic screwdriver-carrying timelord have in common?
The answer is, of course, Diana Gabaldon.

The story goes (by the author herself) that she was watching a repeat of the Doctor Who episode, The War Games (1969), when she came across The Doctor's Scots companion Jamie McCrimmon (played by English actor Frazer Hines).

McCrimmon had become a regular companion in the BBC science fiction series following the 1966 episode, The Highlanders, set appropriately after the Battle of Culloden – the real-life battle spelled the end of the Jacobite Rising.

Gabaldon found the kilted piper “fetching” and the rest is (Scottish) history.

But while Jamie Fraser may be a fictional character, his family's clan is very real.

With a motto of “Je Suis Prest” (I Am Ready), the Fraser clan is said to have been first recorded in Scotland in about 1160 with a Simon Fraser who owned land in Keith in East Lothian.

Today, Fraser of Lovat – “of Lovat” refers to the lands where the family seat resides – is a prominent Highland Scottish clan situated around the River Beauly in Inverness-shire.

Serendipitously, during Gabaldon's research she uncovered an account of a Fraser of the Master of Lovat's regiment who survived Culloden, providing further inspiration (and the idea for continuing the story past one book).

But what is a clan?

The origin of Scotland's clan system dates back to the 12th century, rooted in the Scottish Highlands.

The term “clan” comes from the Scottish Gaelic word “clann” meaning children. And while clans are rooted in family, not all those members were related. Many were those who lived off land owned by the clan chief or who joined for protection and identity.

While the clan system may no longer have a stronghold in modern day Scotland, there is no less fascination for it (and even some clan chiefs still around, if you fancy joining one), especially for those seeking to trace their Scottish roots.

And if you are tracing your Scottish ancestors, The National Records of Scotland and Scotland's People are a good place to start.



Highland Games

Some believe the origins of Highland games date back to the 11th century, when King Malcolm III organised a race near Braemar to find the fastest runner.

The games, as we know them now, were borne out of clan gatherings which featured parades, music, dancing and tests of strength and endurance, overseen by a ceremonial chieftain.

By the 1800s, they had largely fallen into decline until Queen Victoria helped revive the tradition after granting the Braemar Gathering Royal Patronage.

Nowadays, Highland games are a staple of Scotland's events calendar, taking place up and down the country over the spring and summer months.





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TARTANS & TEXTILES

Every picture tells a story but so, too, does an outfit.

The costumes and textiles in Outlander are a dazzling and gritty feast for the eyes, inspired by Scottish history, nature and the characters who inhabit them. It's no surprise given Scotland's fame for fabrics and fashion, from the Paisley Pattern and the textile industry in the Scottish Borders, to Harris Tweed in the Outer Hebrides.

Tartan, as you'd expect given its focus on clans, is prominent throughout Outlander, and the show even created its own official tartan, woven in Scotland and based on original, historic designs.

For those unfamiliar (and there may be some), tartan is a piece of woven cloth made up of horizontal and vertical stripes in different colours, on a coloured background. The interwoven stripes, known as a "sett", create the unique design, and plants, mosses and berries were originally used to dye the wool.

According to the Scottish Register of Tartans, there are now more than 10,000 registered tartans in Scotland.

There are many places throughout Scotland to uncover the country's textile heritage.

Take a trip to the Outer Hebrides to discover Harris Tweed, the only fabric to be guarded and protected by its own Act of Parliament and statutory body, the Harris Tweed Authority. The Harris Tweed Trail takes visitors on a journey to weavers, shops, and places of interest connected to the world-famous weave. Attractions include the Harris Tweed Story Room which offers tours which tell the story of the fabric from the very beginning right through to the present day and live demonstrations of the weavers in action.

The Great Tapestry of Scotland, meanwhile, is a fascinating attraction in the Scottish Borders that combines Scotland's expertise in the craft with the history of the country. A thousand volunteer stitchers, from the Borders to the Highlands and Islands, used 300 miles of woollen thread to depict 420 million years of Scotland's story to create the 160 panels.



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GAELIC LANGUAGE

“Sassenach,” says Jamie.

It may have traditionally been a derogatory term for an English person – derived from the word Saxon – but fans will recognise its more affectionate usage as the nickname our Highlander gives Claire.

Jamie’s fondness for the Scottish Gaelic (Gàidhlig) word even translated off-screen when Sam Heughan gave it to the name of his very own tipple. Slàinte mhath!

Sassenach, however, isn’t the only use of Scotland’s native tongue throughout the seasons.

Indeed, the production hired a Gaelic instructor and dialect coach to teach the cast the language and ensure historical accuracy.

An unforgettable moment in the series is Claire’s introduction to wool waulking in Season One (Episode 5: Rent) filmed at the Highland Folk Museum, in Newtonmore.

Wool waulking is a centuries-old Scottish practice from the Highlands which women did to strengthen and finish freshly woven woollen fabric. The rhythmic ritual involved soaking the fabric before beating and kneading it to the beat of Gaelic songs sung in time.

Badenoch Waulking Group appeared in the episode and the song – “Mo Nighean Donn” which translates as “My brown-haired lass” – is one that has been passed down through the generations as is the oral tradition of these Gaelic compositions.

It’s a memorable scene and one that made the group social media sensations. Since their appearance in Outlander, videos of their annual performances at the Highland Folk Museum have been viewed by millions online.

But Scots Gaelic isn’t restricted to age-old traditions. It is still in use today.

In fact, around 70,000 Scots speak it or are able to understand the language. Venture to the Highlands and islands, the Outer Hebrides, the Isle of Skye, and some places in Argyll & the Isles, and you’re likely to hear it in conversation.

For those more culturally inclined, there is the Royal National Mòd, Celtic Connections, or Scotland’s first ever Gaelic Poetry Path (Slighe

nam Bàrd), created by Sabhal Mòr Ostaig, the National Centre for Gaelic Language and Culture, which takes visitors on a poetic pathway around the Isle of Skye.

You can even spot Gaelic on road signs across the country.

All of this, despite the language being heavily suppressed in the late 18th century, during the infamous Highland Clearances, following the Jacobite Rising. Its resurgence came, in part, by the writings and influence of 19th century Scottish author Sir Walter Scott (check out Abbotsford in the Scottish Borders for more on the novelist).

A little Gaelic to get you started

Pronunciation tip: bh and mh often sound like v, and ch is the back of the throat sound in loch.

Fàilte! (Welcome) – FAHL chuh

Halò! (Hello) – ha LO

Ciamar a tha thu? (How are you? – informal) – KEE mar uh HA oo?

Tapadh leat / leibh (Thank you – informal / formal) – TA puh LYAHT / LAYV

Slàinte mhath! (Cheers!) – SLAAN chuh VAH

Tìoraidh! (Cheerio/Bye) – CHEE ree

FOOD & DRINK

As a combat nurse, Claire's medical knowledge comes in handy in 18th century Scotland. But with no access to modern medicines, she must get up to speed on herbal remedies.

Off-screen, another Claire was guiding cast and crew in the ways of traditional medicine.

Scottish medical herbalist and founder of Herbal Heritage Scotland, Claire Mackay, worked on the series as herbal consultant. She not only assisted Caitríona Balfe (Claire

Fraser) with knowledge of herbs and their preparation, but her expertise helped shape scenes throughout the series.

Here she explores what food and drink was like at the time of Outlander...

The diet of ordinary Highland people was simple, seasonal, and heavily dependent on what could be grown locally or preserved through harsh winters.



Oats formed the basis of everyday food, most commonly eaten as porridge, oatcakes, or bannocks cooked over the hearth. **Barley** was also widely used, especially in broths and ale. **Meat** was less common for poorer families and was often reserved for special occasions, though fish, particularly herring, salmon, and shellfish in coastal areas, were important sources of protein.



Dairy foods such as butter, buttermilk, crowdie cheese (a soft cottage cheese traditionally made by crofters), and kail (cabbage commonly added to broths and stews) featured regularly in the diet. **Root vegetables** including turnips and potatoes became increasingly important, especially in the Highlands where the potato thrived in poor soil and gradually transformed rural nutrition.



Whisky was widely consumed, though often rougher and more locally distilled than the modern spirit. A pound of **tea** was more expensive than the cost of a single sheep,



Seasonal wild herbs were relied upon to add diversity of flavours to meals, especially in households that didn't have access to or couldn't afford foreign spices. A herb that might be included was Soorach, or wild sorrel, found in woodland areas from early spring until late summer and adding a citrus sourness that is also a source of vitamin C.



Watercress found in streams was also gathered for culinary purposes, as was nettle and other herbs which all added a variety of important vitamins and minerals to the diet that would otherwise result in nutritional deficiencies.



Knowledge of plant medicines was a matter of survival and could be the difference between life or death in some instances. Without the medicines which we take for granted today, such as analgesics (pain-relievers) and antibiotics, an understanding of how to effectively use herbal remedies was highly valued.



So much that the **Beaton physicians** were highly esteemed in the Scottish courts and placed in high positions, and gifted lands, on account of their carefully preserved medical knowledge.



It wasn't only professional physicians that went to great lengths to record their wisdom, however, as we see in the 18th century **herbal notebook**, held at the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons in Glasgow, which contains herbal cures written in lowlands Scots.

Geillis Duncan's Digestive Tea

15g Parsley
8g Fennel Seed
8g Peppermint
1/2 tsp Ground ginger (or 1/2 inch chopped fresh)

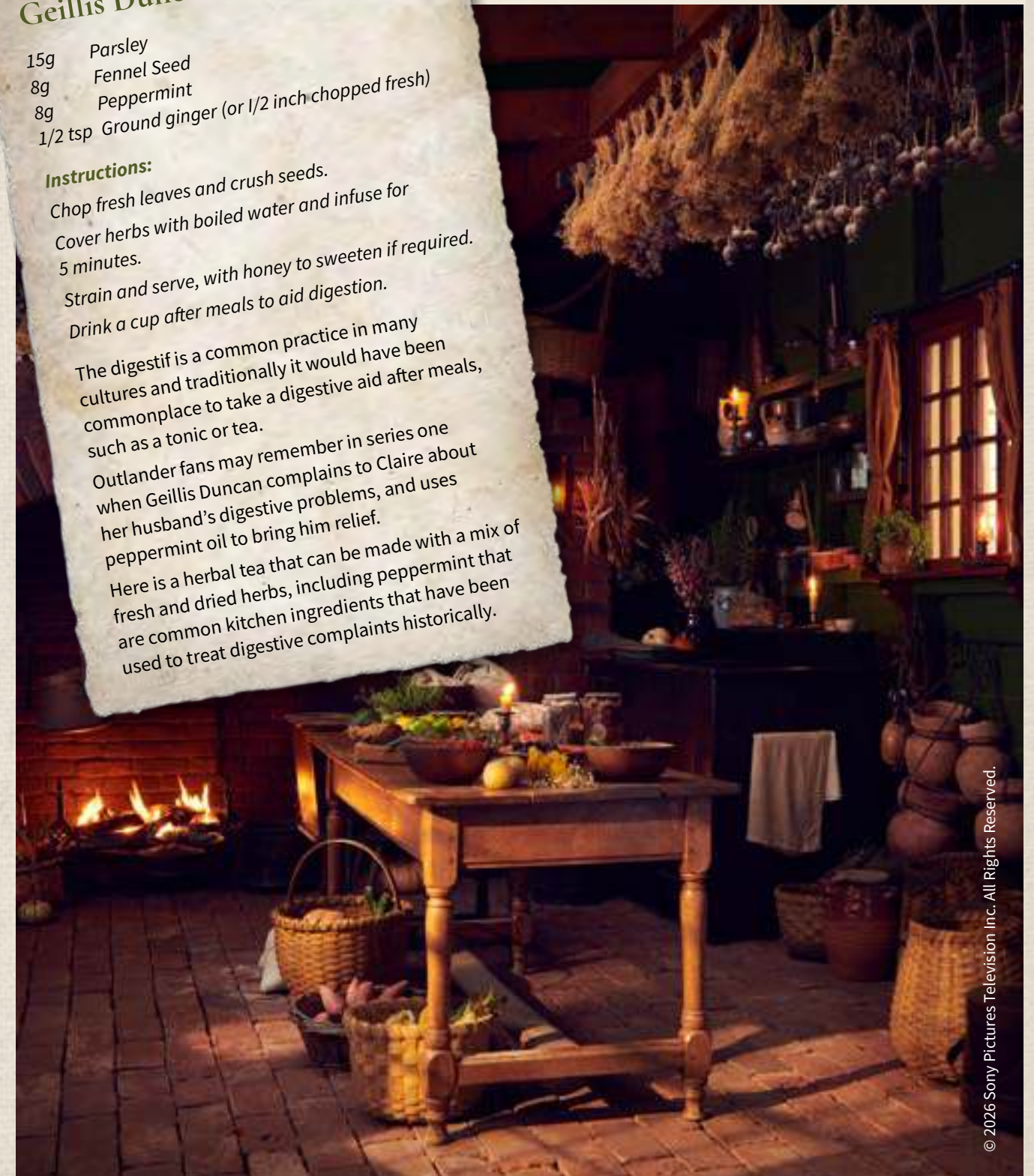
Instructions:

Chop fresh leaves and crush seeds.
Cover herbs with boiled water and infuse for 5 minutes.
Strain and serve, with honey to sweeten if required.
Drink a cup after meals to aid digestion.

The digestif is a common practice in many cultures and traditionally it would have been commonplace to take a digestive aid after meals, such as a tonic or tea.

Outlander fans may remember in series one when Geillis Duncan complains to Claire about her husband's digestive problems, and uses peppermint oil to bring him relief.

Here is a herbal tea that can be made with a mix of fresh and dried herbs, including peppermint that are common kitchen ingredients that have been used to treat digestive complaints historically.

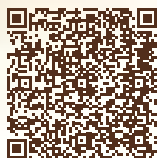
